

Needle & syringe reach, by gender








Needle & syringe reach, by population group








Needle & syringe reach, by age




Needle & syringe distribution & return rate














TB testing & treatment cascade








HCV testing & treatment cascade












Opioid substitution therapy



Issues & challenges



- The team was robbed at gunpoint and 2 attempted robbery in November, this has affected service
 delivery in ETK West and we had clients that has missing risk assessments and 2 clients that needed to be
 linked for ART.
- Due to a shortage of outreach drivers, the Advocacy Officer was tasked to transport the outreach team
 to the various places. This has resulted in decreased advocacy interventions to enhance stakeholder
 engagements. The Advocacy Officer had to balance between the advocacy duties and driving the team.
- Food, clothing and shelter are always a challenge especially for clients that are taking ART/TB/OST/Hepatitis treatment.
- Low distribution of HR packs due to not having sufficient HR packs stock.
- Clients do not have IDs and this makes it harder for them to look for employment.




Successes



- The task team formed under the LDAC Meetings has successfully delivered the first workshop, the Advocacy Officer and Project Coordinator still form part of the task team to formulate the objectives to be discussed with people who use drugs in the district.
- The psychosocial team started the Women empowerment groups and these take place weekly. The team host a Women's Day event(once a month), where we have designated hours for females, in these sessions female clients receives SRH services, they get to have a shower, do their hair/nails/make up and they get refreshments.
- Reach at 107%, HTS at 103% and ART Linkage 116% and OST retention rate 123%(clients retained for 6 months and more). Needle return rate has increased from 58% to 83%.
- 17 clients were reunified with their families and counselling was provided to the support people and 10 clients found employment.
- The team supported the World Aids Day events that was hosted by the Pinetown SAPS, one that was hosted by
 Provincial Aids Council and the Civil society and one that was hosted by uShaka Marine and the PWID staff successfully
 delivered HTS services and health education
