





Nelson Mandela University Medical Students Awarded Prestigious Chan Soon-Shiong Family Foundation- SAMRC NMU Medical School Scholarship

The SAMRC entered into a partnership with the Chan Soon-Shiong Family Foundation to build a skilled workforce focused largely on the biomanufacturing sector. This was made possible through a generous donation of the Chan Soon-Shiong Family Foundation to the SAMRC.

The CSSFF-SAMRC program supports the skills development training of young African scientists through studentships, scholarships (MSc and PhD) and postdoctoral fellowships. In this workstream, the CSSFF in collaboration with the SAMRC has awarded a 6-year grant totaling R6M to the Nelson Mandela University (NMU) to support a cohort of seven (7) Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery (MBChB) students who are both academically and financially deserving. These life-changing scholarships will enable the students to pursue their dreams of becoming medical professionals.

The Chan Soon-Shiong Family Foundation has recognized the potential and determination of these outstanding scholars, providing them with financial support to overcome the challenges they have faced on their journey to becoming doctors.

Among the recipients is Keagan Brown, a Nelson Mandela University medical student with a fervent desire to make a difference in people's lives. Drawing inspiration from his experience assisting at a day-care centre where his mother worked, Keagan is dedicated to providing comprehensive care for children in need.

Khanyisile Mtsweni, another deserving scholarship recipient, has harbored the dream of studying medicine since her early school days.
